In our last prayer letter, we reported that Sunday Schools in Kenya had reopened after being closed for nearly a year. Our joy was short-lived, however, as Kenya went under its second lock down. During the month of April, churches in our area were not able to meet at all. Sunday's messages were preached from our home, and many of our people were able to join by Zoom. I continued to teach the Wednesday night classes from my house, and the students were able to attend those virtually as well. Unfortunately, because of the lock down, the Rift Valley Baptist College had to once again cancel its classes. Some planned "work and learn" days for our youth were also canceled. These are days where the youth from our church will spend half a day working on the farm in order to earn money for school fees and school materials. In the afternoon,

they will be served lunch after which they will taught from the Bible. Now that churches and Sunday Schools have opened back up, we want to implement this plan in the near future.

The first week of April, I came down with COVID-19. Although I did not have a very bad case, I did quarantine away from my family and everyone else for two weeks. During those two weeks, our fellow missionary, Billy Coley, filled the pulpit for me. In order to help him gain experience in both languages, he continues to preach often at Karen Baptist Church, both in the English service as well as in the Swahili service. His wife, Crystal, plays the piano for our services and helps out in Sunday School. We have really enjoyed working alongside the Coleys these past four months.

The farm aspect of our ministry continues to thrive. Behind our house sits a large tract of land, over half an acre, that we cultivate. The farm not only allows me to employ several men from our church, it is a way for us to reach into the homes of people around us. Every week, we sell organic vegetables, eggs from our chicken coop, and baked goods to people in our community.

Many of these people live behind locked gates in well-to-do homes, homes that we never would have gained access to without the

Our future plan for the farm is that it will one day fully support the students who will be attending the Deaf Bible College.

Last year, when our youngest daughter, Stacy, was born, the car that has served us well for the past ten years was no longer big enough for our family to go places together. So for the past six months, we have prayed every night as a family that God would give us the vehicle that He wanted us to have.
